1. Why do you wish to serve on the Ohio City Incorporated Board of Trustees?:

I have worked as an attorney for fourteen (14) years and am currently employed by the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office where I work in the Civil Division. When I first graduated from law school, I served as a judicial staff attorney in the Cuyahoga County Court of Common Pleas, assisting the judges overseeing the Court's complex litigation and mass tort docket. Specifically, I had the honor of working for Judge Harry A. Hanna, Judge Leo M. Spellacy, and former Justice Francis E. Sweeney. In 2007, I joined a small Cleveland law firm and entered private practice, where I concentrated on civil and criminal matters, including business litigation. I joined the Prosecutor's Office in 2013 and my practice remains focused on litigation

litigation in the state and federal courts. In my capacity as a Prosecutor in the Civil Division, I also serve as house counsel to clients that include the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections, the Cuyahoga County Public Library, and the Cuyahoga County Board of Health, although I litigate on behalf of almost all County agencies.

In particular, I believe that my service in the Prosecutor's Office, and my experience working and communicating with our Criminal Prosecutors assigned to Region Two, which covers Ohio City, is instrumental as Ohio City Incorporated addresses the criminal issues in our neighborhood.

3. Describe your involvement in Ohio City neighborhood organizations or Ohio City Incorporated sponsored committees, projects, or block clubs. :

I currently serve as the Vice President of the Bridge/Carroll/Jay Block Club and have served on the Board of Ohio City Incorporated for three (3) years. I have also both attended and volunteered for the Evening in Ohio City and volunteered for Station Hope at St. John's Church.
